

HI committed to Syrians since 2012

Humanity & Inclusion (HI) has been a leading humanitarian actor in Syria for more than 13 years, responding to a wide range of needs across health, protection, and inclusion. HI places a particular focus on supporting persons with disabilities and people injured by violence and explosive ordnance (EO), providing physical rehabilitation, psychosocial support, and access to assistive technologies. In parallel, HI's expertise in humanitarian mine action (HMA), including risk education, clearance, victim assistance and advocacy, helps mitigate the daily threats posed by explosive ordnance and facilitates the safe return and recovery of affected





communities.

Over 13 years of actions in Syria and neighboring countries

HI initially launched its response to the Syrian crisis in neighbouring countries, Lebanon and Jordan, in May 2012, and commenced operations inside Syria in November 2012. Subsequently, HI expanded its operations to include Syrian refugees in Iraqi Kurdistan in the summer of 2014.

Currently, HI provides **physical rehabilitation and psychosocial support** to people with disabilities or people who have been injured in the violence, including the provision of assistive devices and prosthetic and orthotic services. HI has extended psychosocial support to the caregivers of people with disabilities.

In addition, HI is providing **stimulation therapy** to malnourished children to prevent the long-term consequences of malnutrition.



The programme actively promotes the inclusion of people with disabilities in

humanitarian relief efforts. Recently, HI started implementing inclusive education activities to promote the access to school for children with disabilities.


As part of HI's HMA activities, it also conducts **clearance operations** and delivers **risk education** awareness campaigns to protect civilians from the dangers of explosive remnants of war.

The 2023 earthquake

Since the earthquake on February 6, 2023, HI has been providing assistance to victims and their families, focusing on post-surgery rehabilitation care and psychosocial support.

HI also started contributing to **disaster**

risks reduction efforts through supporting communities and local partners to better prevent disasters, prepare for them, act in anticipation based on warnings, and adapt to climate change impacts, while leaving no one behind.



2024 figures

- 51 154 beneficiaries of mental health
- 9 597 assistive devices distributed
- 134 871 beneficiaries of rehabilitation
- 16 532 m2 of shallow water cleared (Euphrates River)
- 488 716 m2 of land cleared

Our intervention

Multi-disciplinary Physical Rehabilitation

Provision of physiotherapy, prosthetics & orthotics, assistive devices and PSS to injured individuals and persons with disabilities, through HI partners and mobile teams working in fix points located in health facilities.

Mental Health and Psychosocial Support

Individual and group support for trauma recovery, anxiety and psychosocial distress, with a focus on people with disabilities and caregivers.

Protection

Inclusive case management of persons with disabilities and vulnerable persons among IPDs and host communities to overcome barriers to access humanitarian assistance.

Inclusive Education in Emergencies (EiE)

Operational and technical partnerships with major EiE actors to support inclusion of children with disabilities in non-formal education.

Humanitarian Mine Action: A Comprehensive Approach

In schools, IDP sites, and communities across Northeast Syria and Northwest Syria to reduce civilian exposure to explosive hazards; carrying out Explosive Ordnance Clearance (in Northeast Syria) to remove explosive ordnance from critical areas and infrastructure, including water channels; supporting Victim Assistance: identification and referral of victims of explosive ordnance to relevant services, including medical care, rehabilitation, mental health and psychosocial support and socio-economic inclusion.



Inclusive Humanitarian Action

Training and technical support to humanitarian coordination mechanism and actors, including local stakeholders, to ensure their services are inclusive of persons with disabilities.


Advocacy

HI conducts evidence-based advocacy to promote the rights of persons with disabilities, survivors of explosive ordnance, and returnees in Syria. Efforts focus on protecting civilians, ensuring inclusive access to humanitarian services, supporting safe and voluntary returns, and securing sustained humanitarian access in line with international humanitarian law and disability rights frameworks.

HI Partners

As of 2025, HI collaborates with over 15 national and local partners across Syria. These partnerships cover a wide range of activities such as physical rehabilitation, psychosocial support, risk education, and contamination mapping. By working closely with health actors, mine action organizations, and local NGOs, HI ensures a comprehensive, community-based response that enhances the reach and impact of its humanitarian programs.
